From the School Director's Office

As we continue with our preparation toward the IB authorization process, I wanted to remind everyone of the IB Mission statement and how deeply it resonates with our purpose at Pledge Harbor School.

"The International Baccalaureate aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect. To this end the organization works with schools, governments and international organizations to develop challenging programmes of international education and rigorous assessment. These programmes encourage students across the world to become active, compassionate and lifelong learners who understand that other people, with their differences, can also be right."

What goal could be more desirable than developing a better and more peaceful world? How can we at Pledge Harbor contribute to a society that stresses intercultural understanding, and the need to develop internationally minded students? How can this goal be achieved? Through our curriculum choices and activities, we aim to educate our students to become caring, knowledgeable, inquiring, helpful students who consciously make decisions through the lenses of understanding and respect.
