

Math **Department**

The math department

consists of Mr. Mubin (head of the math department), Mr. Zubair, Mr. Sharad, and Mr. Horner. All of us have been working diligently to help our students master the challenging math skills that are necessary for them to succeed in their upcoming exams, as well as to find ways to apply the skills they are learning in their lives, thus adding intrinsic value to an often frustrating subject.

Mr. Zubair's grade 10 Additional Maths class is currently showing how to do integration, definite and indefinite integrals, application of integration along with differentiation in finding rate of changes, approximations and kinematics. Integration covers finding the area under a curve and intersecting lines.

Mr. Mubin's tenth graders are investigating the sequences of fractions by using fractions within fractions in their investigations which is part of the IGCSE exam. In addition, they also investigated on how to use graphic display calculator (GDC) to plot quadratic and cubic equations along with finding roots and intercepts of curves. His grade 9 students investigated Pythagorean triples that follow the Pythagorean rules. They also learnt how to prove the similarity of two triangles and find the unknown length, area and volume of similar shapes. The eleventh graders finished their probability and statistics for AS level. They used the normal distribution model for practical solutions and used it as an approximation to the binomial distribution for finding probabilities of events. In Pure Maths, they are studying vector properties, perpendicular and parallel vectors.

Mr. Sharad is covering multiple topics over several grade levels. His sixth graders are studying time the 12-hour and 24-hour clock systems. The ninth graders are researching calculating the area and perimeter of figures in a coordinate plane. Grade 10 is reviewing

previously learned concepts from algebra such as logarithms and quadratic equations in preparation for their upcoming exams. And his eleventh graders are learning about indefinite integration in calculus. Mr. Sharad has also implemented a daily math problem challenge for the school where students can try to solve a problem he posts outside his class. Successful students are recognized during the Thursday assembly.

The eighth graders from Mr. Horner's class have been studying algebraic manipulation and using both substitution and elimination methods to find the values of two unknown variables in two different equations. They have also been spending time on IXL.com. The students are able to earn class cash and house points from Mr. Horner for their achievements, time, and effort spent on the website. IXL is a great way to practice multiple school skills, but it is more than that as well. If a problem is answered incorrectly, a mini-lesson is shown for students to learn how to solve the problem. The eighth graders are enjoying their time on IXL.

At present Grades 3/4 students are inquiring about prehistory and early man and Grade 5 students are learning about the various government systems around the world, including Bangladesh. All the students from Grade 5 have chosen their symbols and have presented their agendas in front of the teachers and students. In the next issue of the newsletter, we will present our PYP leader for you. On 17 March 2016, the PYP section will have their first SLC (Student Led Conference). You will receive an invitation for the same. Please visit the various classrooms and workstations and witness the students' portfolios and take part in various activities which are being planned. It will be a great motivation for the young learners. Thank you so much for your constant support and encouragement.

Teacher Feature Jabir (Grade 11)

Mr. Sharad Detha is from Rajasthan, India and has recently joined Pledge Harbor as a math teacher for IBDP. He has been teaching for last ten years in different curriculums. Prior to Pledge Harbor, he had been teaching at Indus International School, Bangalore. For the teacher feature column of this month, we had the pleasure to take an interview of him.

What do you want to be doing in ten years?

I will say, in ten years, I will have my own school. I started planning well in advance.

What personal strengths do you find helpful in teaching?

I respect each student's dignity. I am always unbiased to my students. I don't judge them on their color, countries, languages. What I always see is their knowledge.

What do you like most about teaching as a career?

Meeting new students and communicating with them. Because every time I meet a student, it brings new energy to my life.

Why do you want to teach IB?

I taught CBSE for ten years, but I found it teacher-driven, whereas IB is more student-centered, where the students try to find out the reason behind everything. It encourages me to learn more and deliver it in a better way.

What is your least favorite aspect of teaching?

My least favorite aspect of teaching is completing a syllabus.

Describe your teaching style.

In one term I will say it is very democratic. Each student gets equal opportunity in my class. I try and involve humor in class, not sarcasm.

What is the most difficult aspect of teaching today?

Assessing any student based on an exam paper. I think that is a kind of injustice.

What would you tell your incoming class in a "back-to-school" letter at the start of a new school year?

I want to say this to all students, there are very crucial years like grade 10 or 12 in school life when students should be focused to achieve good grades and complete all other requirements for admission to good colleges which will help them to become better people. The most important thing for students is to enjoy learning; that is what a lot of students lack.
